Glasgow Chrism Mass 2013

Archbishop Tartaglia celebrated his first Chrism Mass as Archbishop of Glasgow



on Holy Thursday in St. Andrew's Cathedral. The church was packed out, with members of the congregation finding seats with the choir in the choir loft and others having to stand at the back of the church. The number of concelebrating priests filled the sanctuary and the additional seats placed at the front of the nave. The large numbers reflected a new feeling of anticipation in the air with the election of Pope Francis as well as perhaps a desire to be supportive of their Bishop and priests at a time of difficulty in the church in Scotland.

The music of the Mass was led by the St.

Mungo Singers who sang a number of motets in preparation for the beginning of the Mass. As Archbishop Tartaglia, Archbishop Emeritus Conti and priests processed through the Cathedral, they then led the congregation in singing "Christ be our Light", a hymn whose

words are so appropriate for this time, "Make us your own, your holy people, light for the world to see".

In his homily, Archbishop Tartaglia expressed his sense of privilege in celebrating the Chrism Mass with so many, priests and lay, young and old. He acknowledged that emotions were heightened at this sad and difficult time but urged the congregation not to give into feelings of self-pity or anger but to look to the Lord for hope and renewal, forgiveness and peace. He welcomed the large group of students from secondary schools who had come for this special Mass at which their priests renewed their priestly commitment and the oils for the sacraments would be blessed. Addressing the priests, he invited them to renew their commitment with faith, trust and humility. He commented that Pope Francis has caught the imagination of the world and his view of the life of the church is that it is to look to Christ first and foremost, and then outwards to those who are "Christless". It must go out to those who need evangelising and to the poor and needy of the world in love and compassion. He then invited the congregation to pray for and support their priests, that all would emerge from this time purified and renewed. There was a feeling of determined affirmation within the congregation as the Mass proceeded, that the Lord could bring good out of the dark, as he had done in the first Holy Week, and people and priests joined wholeheartedly in the celebration.

Just Prayer – An Evening of Prayer & Reflection in Memory of Archbishop Romero


To mark the anniversary of the assassination of Archbishop Oscar Romero on 24 March 1980, Marie Cooke of the Archdiocesan Justice & Peace Commission in Glasgow organised an ecumenical service of prayer and reflection at St. Anne's parish in Dennistoun on 21 March.

This proved a truly inspirational celebration, with a mixture of prayer, scripture, readings, and music, supported by Powerpoint presentations, YouTube clips and

film as visual aids. Musical support was provided by the East End Deanery choir conducted by Patricia McGlinchey and with Mark O'Neill on the organ. Two students from St. Mungo's Academy were the prayer leaders. Representatives from Action of Churches Together in Scotland (ACTS) and Glasgow Churches Together (GCT) were present in the congregation, as was Archbishop Emeritus Mario Conti and MSP John Mason.

The service began with John Bell and Graham Maule's "Will you Come and Follow Me", followed by an invitation to everyone to greet the person next to them with a sign of peace as they became a worshipping community, and a reminder that we do not need to go to El Salvador to find deprivation, lack of respect for human rights or marginalisation. We can find these uncomfortably close to home. The Romero Way of the Cross was read by Honor Hania of the Commission, as the moving and challenging images of this meditation were shown on a screen. A scripture reading followed – the well-known passage from Isaiah 61 which had been read by Jesus himself at the beginning of his ministry. Psalm 34 (a YouTube excerpt in images and music) – The Lord hears the cry of the poor – was a fitting response. The congregation spontaneously joined in the psalm response and the effect was so moving, a moment when the power of music in the liturgy was clear.

Before the reading of the Gospel – Matthew's version of the Beatitudes – the very appropriate Gospel acclamation from Micah 6:8 was sung: "This is what the Lord asks of you, this, only this. To act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly with your God." After a time of silent reflection the congregation then joined in the singing of "Come back to me". As a reflection, Archbishop Conti read an extract from Archbishop Romero's last Sunday homily. Then to the accompaniment of Romero's own voice and Salvadorean music, the congregation came forward to light and place a candle before the altar as a sign and pledge of their personal commitment to peace and justice. This part of the service was completed by the singing of the passionate words of the hymn "To the Victims" to the glorious music of Finlandia. Intercessions followed: for peace, for people and organisations working for peace and justice, for the martyrs of our own time, for our new pope and for all present. The service ended with the "Romero Prayer" and the singing of a final hymn of determined affirmation "We shall go out with hope of resurrection" There was a feeling of inspiration in the air as we left St. Anne's to go out into the cold evening, and a desire to meet and celebrate again next year.



The Feast of the Ascension can sometimes seem a bit neglected—not least because it falls (in Scotland) on a Thursday, a weekday, when parishes often find it difficult to muster the same support as on a Sunday.

Hymns for the Feast might include: 'Alleluia Sing to Jesus; Now the Green Blade; Marty Haugen's 'We walk by Faith' (excerpt below); Go ye Afar (Go Spread my Word); Crown him with many Crowns; the Canticle from Phil 2:6-11 (Though Jesus Christ) (under canticles in stmungomusic.org.uk) and there are lots more.



Entrance Antiphons








Litany for the Vigil for the Dead

Many families bring their dead to lie in the church overnight before the Funeral Mass. There is always a short service to welcome the remains and the mourners, and the Funeral Liturgy provides a sample 'Vigil Service' with a Litany as part of it. The words are quite beautiful and the litany is enhanced when the 'Lord, have mercy' is sung.

Priest: Let us turn to Christ Jesus with confidence and faith in the power of his cross and resurrection.

A reader or minister then continues:

Risen Lord, pattern of our life for ever: Lord, have mercy R: Lord, have mercy.



Promise and image of what we shall be: Lord, have mercy R: Lord, have mercy.

Son of God, who came to destroy sin and death: Lord, have mercy. R: Lord, have mercy.

Word of God who delivered us from the fear of death: Lord, have mercy. R: Lord, have mercy.

Crucified Lord, forsaken in death, raised in glory: Lord, have mercy. R: Lord, have mercy.

Lord Jesus, gentle Shepherd who bring rest to our souls, give peace to N for ever: Lord, have mercy R: Lord, have mercy.

Lord Jesus, you bless those who mourn and are in pain. Bless N's family and friends who gather around him/her today: Lord, have mercy. R: Lord, have mercy.

The East End Deanery Choir A report from Sr Margaret Rose Bradley SND

The East End Deanery Choir, formed in November 2012, is made up of singers from all over the city's 'East End' including St Maria Goretti's, St Paul's, St Thomas's, St Joseph's, St Barnabas, St Bernadette's, St Jude and St John Ogilvie's – and has been conducted by Patricia McGlinchey and Sr Margaret Rose Bradley, while Mark O'Neill and Catherine Queen have been the organists.. The events which they have already supported give an indication of the vigorous strength of their commitment: a 2012 Christmas Concert and a 2013 Ecumenical Service for the Week of Prayer in 2013 in St Thomas's, Riddrie; the Romero Service in St Anne's, Dennistoun; and the Lenten Deanery Mass at St Maria Goretti's, Cranhill.

On Monday 11th March many of the choir members with a few new recruits formed the Deanery Choir for the Lenten Station Mass celebrated with Archbishop Philip Tartaglia in St Maria Goretti's Church, Cranhill. The church itself was packed as was the choir loft and the choir ably led the singing while the congregation joined in with full voices, notably in Bernadette O'Farrell's marvellous 'Christ be our Light' with a soprano descant arranged by Mark O'Neill. The children from St Maria Goretti's school, smartly dressed in their school uniform, created an expectant stillness as they sang before Mass, and they sang a two-part version of Panis Angelicus at Communion. The psalm was Gerry Fitzpatrick's setting of Psalm 29 (Psalms of the Seasons, Kevin Mayhew for St Mungo Music) and was sung by Patricia McGlinchey. The Sanctus and Memorial were taken from the new St Andrew Mass. Much of the choir's support for the congregation was in two parts, but the Communion 'Behold the Lamb' was well done in 4 parts. Archbishop Tartaglia remarked on the music and the fine singing of the Deanery Choir and thanked the children for adding to the occasion. The Mass was followed by refreshments in the church hall served by the ladies of the parish with typical Maria Goretti hospitality.

Thursday 20th March saw some members of the choir supporting Romero Week in St Anne's Church in Whitevale Street, Dennistoun—see the report on page 2. The choir has also been invited to sing at a wedding in Christ the King Church on Saturday 20th April.

The whole team behind this Deanery initiative deserve the highest praise. Patricia remarked that 'people love coming together for these events' – and it helps that they always have a social break during their rehearsals.
